


Overview of MARSEC Incidents in the Singapore Strait







OBSERVATIONS

Statistics

- 13 TRAPS incidents (12 Boardings and 1 Attempted Boarding) were reported in Dec 2024. This is higher than previous years Dec 2023 (2 incidents) and Dec 2022 (5 incidents).
- 9 incidents occurred in the Singapore Strait (SS), 2 in Indonesia, 1 in Vietnam, and 1 in the South China Sea (SCS). These incidents involved 7 bulk carriers, 3 tankers, 1 cargo vessel, 1 container vessel, 1 tug and barge. 10 incidents occurred while ships were underway, and 3 occurred while ships were at anchored.
- Of the 13 incidents, 1 resulted in minor injuries to the crew.

Singapore Strait (SS)

- •7 Sea Theft and 2 Sea Robbery occurred in Phillip Channel while ships were underway.
- 2 Sea Robbery incidents occurred in the Philip Channel on 2 and 11 Dec. Both incidents involved confrontations with 2 to 8 perpetrators armed with knives. 1 incident (11 Dec), a crew member sustained multiple minor cut wounds (Minor Injury) and incident on 2 Dec, a crew member was tied up but reported no injuries. The perpetrators stole engine spare parts before fleeing the scene.
- The 7 Sea Theft incidents took place on 7 Dec, 2350 (UTC+8) and 0346 (UTC+8), 10, 14, 17, 22 and 28 Dec. 4 incidents reported the perpetrators were armed with knives and 'gun like object'. Upon being noticed by the crew, the alarms were raised and the perpetrators escaped. Items stolen included ship's store item and engine parts. There were no confrontations or injuries reported.
- The ships were able to continue their voyages to the next port without requiring any assistance.

Indonesia

• 2 Sea Theft incidents (3 and 14 Dec) occurred at Belawan and Panjang Anchorage while ships were anchored. The incidents involved confrontations with 4–5 perpetrators. 1 incident (14 Dec), the perpetrators were reportedly armed with knives and machetes. No injuries were reported, and nothing was stolen in both incident.

South China Sea (SCS)

 1 Sea Theft incident (11 Dec) occurred at SCS while ship were underway with unknown number of perpetrators involved. No injuries were reported, and nothing was stolen.

Vietnam

• 1 Sea Theft incident (18 Dec) occurred at Vung Tau Achorage while ship were anchored. No injuries were reported, and ship's store was stolen.


Comme

- Perpetrators continue to target slow-speed and low-freeboard vessels such as bulk carriers and tugs.
- Most of the incidents occurred during the period of darkness, between 2200H (UTC +8) to 0600H (UTC +8).
- As such, all companies, sea users, and ship masters are advised to remain vigilant when transiting known hotspots, such as the Phillip Channel, waters off Batam and Bintan islands, and Batam Anchorages.





Maritime Incidents (MI)

OBSERVATIONS

Statistics:

- A total of 62 maritime incidents were reported this month, which is lower than the number recorded in the same period in 2023 (70) but higher than the figure for 2022 (59).
- The largest number of reported incidents was sunkcapsized (25), followed by adrift(12) and collision-grounding (8).
- In terms of location, the highest number of reported incidents occurred in the waters of the Vietnam (15), Indonesia(11) and Philippines (11).
- A total of 22 individuals were reported dead or missing for the month which is lower than both the previous month (38) and the same period in 2023 (632). Overall, 48 SAR operations were conducted which led to the rescue of 459 individuals.


• There were no major storms in the IFC's AOI this month, however bad weather was still the most common reported incident cause (19 of 64 incidents).






Illegal, Unreported, and Unregulated Fishing (IUUF)

Statistics:


- Total: 32 IUUF incidents (45 FVs) were recorded in IFC's AOI in December 2024. This figure is notably lower compared to December 2023 by 46 also than November 2024 (63) by 64 incidents.
- <u>Local</u>: 14 local incidents (19 FVs involved) were recorded in December 2024. This figure is lower than the number of December 2023 (35) by 22, also November 2024 (25) by 17.
- Majority of FVs involved in local incidents occurred in Indonesia and Sri Lanka with 9 FVs (47.4%), followed by Malaysia 7 FVs, Philippines with 2 FVs and Vietnam by 1 FVs
- <u>Poaching</u>: 18 poaching incidents (26 FVs involved) were recorded in December 2024. This figure is notably lower than in December 2023 (35) by 21 also than November 2024 (48) by 37.
- The largest proportion of poaching incidents is China 10 FVs (38.5%), followed by India and Unspecified country by 7 FVs each, and 2 of Bangladesh FVs (7.7%).
- <u>International</u>: No international incident was recorded in November 2024.


Comments:

• The number of incidents this month is relatively lower compared to December 2023 and November 2024. This could be attributed to the efforts of countries' agencies to prevent IUUF including MMEA, BAKAMLA, TNI AL and Thai-MECC. But an ongoing fishing season in China, which can affect the number of IUUF, not withstanding the bad weather during this month.






Statistics:

In December 2024, IFC recorded 29 contraband smuggling incidents.

Drugs (x8, 2,731.27 kg):

Malaysia x3 (Cough syrup): Meth (114 kg);

Sri Lanka x2 Cannabis(314.775 kg)

Vietnam (x1, 2.5 kg):

Indoneisa (x1, Meth 0.002kg).

Australia (x1, Cocaine 2.3 tonnes)

Fuel (x7, 151,000 kg): Vietnam (x6, Dissel 146,000 kg);

Sabah (x1, Petrol 5,000kg).

Natural Resources (x4, 403,1 tonnes): Vietnam x2 (Woods 600m3, sand 4,700 m3), Sri Lanka x2 (x1, Tendu leaves 2129kg).

Tobacco (x1, 1550packs): Viet Nam (Cigarettes 1550packs).

Domestic Products (x7, 382.414 tonnes): Thailand (x2), Hong Kong (x1), Celebes Sea (x1), India(x1), Vietnam (x2).

Wildlife (x2): Indonesia (x1), Viet nam (x1).





- In December 2024, IFC reported a decrease in contraband smuggling incidents compared to last month and the same period in the previous year.
- Drugs continued to be the largest proportion of reported incidents, with a similar number of cases. Still, they increased in particularly the volume of drugs, cocaine especially which were destined for Australia.





Statistics:

• 5 incidents were recorded this this month - 2 IHM incidents, 2 incidences of Human Trafficking and 3 Illegal Documentation incident.

Comments:


- Incidents this month were varied, with a Rohingya migrant vessel found adrift off Trincomalee, Sri Lanka and a vessel attempting to re-enter North Sumatra illegally by sea. Three Illegal Documentation cases involving Myanmar citizens working on fishing vessels in Malaysia.
- IHM activity continues to be consistently low compared to previous years. It is possible that there will be large Rohingya IHM incidents over the next two months based on historical trends and seasonal weather patterns.








• A total of 4 ENVSEC incidents were recorded this month, involving both types of MARPOL incidents (liquid and solid). This figure is lower than the incident numbers recorded in November 2024 by 2 and December 2023 by 7 Incidents. The adoption of satellite imagery is one of the likely avenues that has helped regional authorities capture pictures of ENVSEC in the region. Of note, oil spill is the main reason and occurred by vessels while berthed at harbor.











IFC Recommendations

- 1. All mariners to report any maritime security incidents timely to the nearest coastal state and inform the IFC at the earliest possible time.
- 2. All mariners are strongly recommended to be vigilant, in particularly when operating in IFC identified hotspots (Westbound lane of Traffic Separation Scheme in Singapore Strait, Eastbound lane of Traffic Separation Scheme in Singapore Strait, Belawan and Dumai Anchorages in Indonesia, Manila Anchorage in the Philippines, and Chittagong Outer Anchorage in Bangladesh).
- 3. All mariners are advised to adopt **Ship Protection Measures** recommended in the <u>Regional Guide to Counter Piracy and Armed Robbery Against Ships in Asia</u> (e.g., illuminating the accommodation block and poop deck, deploying sentries and increase frequency of security rounds).
- 4. All mariners to take note on the description of the perpetrators and to take photos of the perpetrators if possible. Where available, CCTV footage capturing the incident should be provided to **the coastal state authorities** for follow-on investigation.
- 5. All mariners are advised to participate in **IFC Voluntary Community Reporting (VCR)** as depicted in **MARSEC Chart Q6112 and Q6113**. In case of any doubt, incident at sea, suspicious approach or unusual observed activity at sea, please contact the IFC Duty Officer:






